

How can I pay for PrEP?

Good News!

PrEP is covered by most insurance programs, **Medicaid**, and **Medicare**. This means you won't have to pay for the medication, clinic visits, or lab tests you need while you take PrEP.

Are you taking CHARGE of your Sexual Health?



- There are about 1.2 million people with HIV in the US
- Around 32,000
 people are diagnosed with HIV
 every year
- 67% of new diagnoses are in gay or bisexual men but people of all genders, sexual orientations, races or ethnicities, and ages can get HIV
- HIV is an STI, and if you're at risk for infections such as gonorrhea and chlamydia, you're at risk for HIV





There is medication to help keep you from getting HIV.

This medication is called **PrEP**, or preexposure prophylaxis.

This means **PREVENTING HIV** before you could be exposed to it.



PrEP can lower your chances of getting HIV through sex by more than 90% and through injection drug use by 74%.



Could PrEP be right for me?



- Do you have sex but don't always use a condom?
- P Have you had an STI in the past 6 months?
- Does your partner have HIV?
- Is your partner unaware if they are HIV positive or negative?
- Does your partner inject drugs?

 - Have an injection partner who has HIV, or
 - Share needles or other works



- P Have you been prescribed PEP (postexposure prophylaxis) and
 - Are still at risk of getting HIV, or
 - Have used PEP more than once

What do I need to get started on PrEP?

The first thing you need to do is **get tested for HIV.**

PrEP is <u>only</u> for people who **do not have HIV**.



Talk to your doctor about getting tested for HIV and other blood tests that can help make sure you can take PrEP!

What are my PrEP options?

PrEP

TRUVADA[®] is a pill you take **once a day.** It is also available as a generic.



DESCOVY® is another pill you take once a day. There are a few differences between DESCOVY® and TRUVADA®. It's important to talk to your doctor about which one is **right for you**.



APRETUDE[®] is a shot you get **every 2 months.** You have to come to your doctor's office to get the shot.



Truvada or its generic can be available on-demand instead of a daily pill.

You will take 2 pills 2-24 hours before you have sex, 1 pill 24 hours after the first pills, and 1 pill 48 hours after the first pills.

Will I have to see my doctor regularly?

You'll need to have an HIV test every 2-3 months while you are taking PrEP.
